



Dear Friends,

Following on with the 'People who inspired me' series; the second person who deeply influenced me was Jack Hebditch. He was proud of his name, which he claimed came from 'hedges and ditches', though I have since found its origin is 7<sup>th</sup> century Anglo-Saxon and quite different. The point was that he was proud of his working background. Jack was a consummate and excellent tradesman, a Wheelwright and Joiner of the old school. I first met him properly waiting for a bus on the way to the Bournemouth and Poole College of Art. This interested him greatly and what he did caught my imagination too, especially as I had a keen interest in furniture design. I used to pop into his old dusty workshop often for a chat but mostly to watch and listen and learn. Even when he was busy he had the time and space for me to just 'be' there. I found the draw of that environment, the tools, the bench that had seen better days, the smell of the wood, Jack's deep connection with his craft and his stories irresistible. But it was to be another five years before I actually worked there.

When Jack took me on and agreed to train me he was well past retiring age. Only his silver hair and weathered features betrayed this fact. His strength, agility and enthusiasm seemed undimmed as of a man twenty years his junior. He was always careful but he was not averse to walking along the ridge of a strong roof without aid to repair a single broken tile. His gentle manner and his sense of humour were infectious and we laughed together every day. What I noted was that this was especially true when things were going wrong, when we should have been moaning. But Jack didn't do moaning; he was an eternal optimist and I soon discovered why.

In his youth Jack had been a rebel. He didn't ever cross the line as far as the law was concerned. That seemed to have been kept in check after an acquaintance of his, 'Stickey' Wilson, received three strokes of the birch for some misdemeanour or another. According to Jack he went 'straight as a die' after that but Jack liked being a rebel. He owned a rather noisy Morgan three wheeler, which he delighted in parking outside the Methodist Chapel on a Sunday evening. He would wait for the sermon to begin and then rev the car up until the door to the chapel opened. He would then speed off much to the irritation of the steward. He once put his Morgan through an ornamental gate and had to make a new one in his time and at his expense. There were many more stories; in fact, I can't ever remember Jack running out of stories. "So", I said one day, "You were a real tearaway". "Arr", he replied, "I was that. That's why I have a lot of time for young people today. It's no good moaning when you were like that as a nipper". He had a point and he lived by that philosophy.


Several time youngsters caused mischief and damage in the estate yard. Whilst I fumed Jack simply tucked his thumbs behind his braces and said, "Oh well, let's have a cup of tea." He obviously had to inform the estate manager if the loss was really bad but his overall attitude was more of compassion than retribution. Jack taught me to be tolerant and look at the world and people in particular with more understanding. I thank God for Jack and his mentoring and for the skills he taught me. I thank God for the fact that I was able to tell him. Finally I am thankful that Jack found his way back to God and died full of faith in his late nineties, having only fully retired a couple of years before.



We will be able to produce cards appropriate to each individual child for distribution to parents and other nurseries that the child attends. This would enable every child to have their own voice, we will be purchasing Printer ink, card, laminator pockets and files.

We will also be purchasing some of new equipment for our sensory room, that all of the children at Stepping Stones will be able to use. As you can see, all the funds have enabled the organisations to do what they would not have been able to without your support.

There were no planning applications received after 4 September 2013. The Clerk reported that he had received correspondence from Hannick Homes (Connor Lee) who had expressed a wish to speak to the Parish Council about the development of the parcel of land south of St Georges Road. The Parish Council confirmed that it would be pleased to meet up with a representative from Hannick Homes and proposed that councillors would meet up with Hannick Homes at 7.30pm on 9 October for an informal discussion – the date of the next Parish Council meeting - and then invite the representative to stay for the Public Adjournment during the formal part of the PC Meeting; the Parish Council meeting starting, as usual, at 8pm.

Clerk's Note - Subsequent to the meeting, Hannick Homes (Connor Lee) confirmed that a representative (or representatives) would attend as proposed.

The Council noted the change from Written Representations to a Hearing for the Appeal in relation to W/12/02050/FUL (Littleton Stables) and councillors commented that Cllr. Smyth will be invited to represent the Parish Council at that Hearing

**Highways/Environment -** The Council noted the First Round results of The Best Kept Village competition. The Clerk was asked to place a Semington Parish map on the noticeboard in response to one of the comments from the Best Kept Village judges.

Cllr. Wade reported that brambles were obstructing a footpath. Cllr. Rimmer was asked to place a notice in the Newsletter asking householders to ensure that vegetation on their property such as hedges and shrubs is cut back to ensure that the full width of a footway is available for use.

Cllr. Lockwood commented that there were weeds in the pavements and at the kerbsides along many roads in Semington that needed clearing. He was advised to inform Cllr. Smyth who was the Highways and Streetscene Coordinator for the Parish Council.

**Semington War Memorial** -The Clerk stated that Ray Heard who had initiated the Semington War Memorial Renovation Project had offered his apologies for not being able to attend tonight's Parish Council meeting.

The Council **resolved** that the total sum to be raised for this project was to be £1500 and that this sum would comprise a Parish Council contribution of £500, Grant Aid of £500 and Donations from parishioners/local businesses of £500.



#### WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR NEWS FROM JONATHON SEED

It was really great to see the success of three initiatives for involving thousands of young people launched by officers and volunteers working with the areas of my portfolio over the summer. This involved youngsters taking part in free positive activity provided by Wiltshire Council. 50 000 free swimming sessions in our swimming pools, 360 free tennis sessions and 8900 free reading challenge successes in libraries has to be a good thing and a really positive way of helping to get our youth out and about during the long summer break.

Now it is back to school, back to work and back to Council business! This all started with a meeting of the full Council on 3<sup>rd</sup> September where we approved the Business Plan which provides a framework for all our activity over the next four years. It is an interesting document and one which really will keep Wiltshire at the forefront of local government and more importantly will enable us to deliver the services that residents want, deliver these services locally and deliver them in the way that they tell us they want them delivered.

Locally we seem to be having an interesting time with planning issues and particularly big projects that will affect the residents of Summerham and Seend. The RAF Keevil tactical runway seems to have a delay whilst the Council obtains answers to the impact of construction on villages and the surrounding areas. In addition the prospect of a number of large solar panel developments has appeared and these are currently being discussed by consultants, applicants, residents and Parish Councils. I am looking at the plans and listening to the arguments for and against but I am conscious that if communities object so strongly to wind farms then we must at some stage go some way towards meeting our renewable energy targets for Wiltshire and solar panel developments may well be the least intrusive form of sustainable energy generation that we can live with. Still there is a long way to go with all of these developments and it is for the Council to decide and residents to make their views known to the Council to help that decision to be made.

## **High Speed Broadband**

It was recently announced in the press that Wiltshire Council have selected BT to provide broadband upgrading throughout the county. This will use funds provided by BT,the Government and the Council. The project is to be completed by 2016 with the Council aiming to ensure that a minimum of 91% of all premises to have access to it. This is defined by a download speed of a minimum of 24 megabits per second (mbps.)

The remaining 9% of premises will be provided with a minimum speed of 2 mpbs. This might be a small improvement for some but unlike superfast broadband, it will not enable video streaming or easier transmission of large files, etc.

The next stage of the project is to physically survey existing resources and requirements throughout Wiltshire. The county will be divided into eight areas. It is not yet known which areas will be surveyed when. Results will be published as surveys are completed revealing which areas will get superfast and which will be left behind.

At the moment, Semington is scheduled to get superfast broadband early 2015. It is imperative to keep the pressure up so everyone is requested to register their interest even though you may decide not to take it up later on. ## **Funding Available for Village Hall IT Equipment!**

Village halls are vital to local communities and as the world changes, so village halls are looking to the future. Many village halls now offer wireless broadband access, projectors, screens and sound systems. This makes the halls useful for conferences, seminars and local training and learning events.

To help village halls move into digital age, Wiltshire's 18 Area Boards are inviting bids for funding for digital equipment - things like wireless networks, ceiling-mounted projectors, screens and speaker systems.

By having permanent presentation equipment installed, halls can be hired out for things such as training local people in how to use the internet, community reporters, and other functions and events and will save charities and other local organisations having to buy or borrow the equipment (and get it there!)

There are 18 area boards in Wiltshire and they all have a small amount of funding.

There was a rogue trader incident recently. A man knocked on an elderly lady's door and offered garden work. She asked how much it would be to cut two branches down and he said 550- to which she thought he meant £5.50p, so she

agreed. He carried out the work and then went on to cut her hedge - she asked him to stop as she had not agreed to this. He then asked her for 550 and she gave him £5.50p. He became very verbally aggressive and refused to take the money stating that he meant £550. The lady was fortunately very switched on and able and told him that she would not pay him any more than £5.50 and had no cash in the house. The number plate of the white transit van was LB56HKT with "Acorn Tree and Landscaping" on the side. 2 men were on board (one late 20's and one late teens) they also had a child in the van. They left with no payment making threats to return. Please do not agree to have work carried out by these individuals and if he is seen visiting vulnerable addresses call 101 or 999 if a crime is happening.

We are frequently told not to deal with trades people who telephone or call at your door (to tell you your chimney is falling off but they can fix it!). You should only deal with reputable traders that you call in. There is an organisation called Ratedpeople.com – search on Google to get in touch. They are probably slightly more expensive than others, but the two we have used were excellent in every respect. I'm afraid you need a computer and the internet to contact them, so if you don't have one try and get a friend to do it.

We have been asked by Colin Goodhind, of the Melksham Community Area Board, to ask all NHW co-ordinators if they, or anyone they know, would be interested in being a volunteer to help monitor the CCTV system covering Melksham town, when it is up and running. They are looking for a pool of approximately 30 volunteers to offer just a few hours a week each, or whatever they can spare. They say they appreciate that everyone leads very busy lives but if you do know of anyone who would be prepared to offer their time, please let me know and I can then give Colin some figures and get back to you when the system goes on line. This really is a very important and worthwhile tool being put in place to help keep everyone using the town to be safe and minimise crime and antisocial behaviour. (Who knows, we might have one in Semington soon!) Paul Bowyer
