

Extracts from the regulations:

Churchyards are legally owned by the incumbent (Vicar) of the church, during his term of office. No agreement should be entered into with any stonemason or funeral director before the written authorisation of the incumbent has been obtained. Because a churchyard is a public place, and because gravestones will remain in place for many years, some degree of control has to be exercised over inscriptions. They should be simple, dignified and reverent.

The incumbent does not have authority to allow any of the following:

- Kerbs, railings, fencing, chippings, statues or any stone in the shape of a heart.
- Anything fixed to or hung upon any monument, including insignia, crosses, images, models, paintings or photographs.
- Plastic and other synthetic materials.
- Artificial flowers except remembrance poppies from 20<sup>th</sup> Oct. to 20<sup>th</sup> Dec.
- Any carving other than flora, fauna and small crosses.
- Any badge or insignia other than of the armed forces.

Stone should be natural and with a non-reflecting finish. The type and colour of the stone should be in keeping with what is commonly used locally, and in particular with that used for the church itself, if stone built. If granite is used it must not be polished above eggshell, and dark grey, black or any colour not in keeping with the local environment are prohibited.

**All** interments, including ashes, whether in a previous grave or a new plot must pay the requisite fee. Current table of fees is on display in the church porch.

result of having very kindly been given some chick eggs. The children, staff and some parents and visitors have watched in fascination as the chicks have hatched and grown. They have been checking on the chicks each day and watching closely the changes they are going through.

Finally, the Friends of the school held a very successful film night to raise funds for the school and provide the children with yet another wonderful experience.

#### WILTSHIRE COUNCIL NEWS FROM JONATHON SEED

As Joel Gray famously sang in Cabaret 'Money makes the world go around'. Luckily we are not faced with the hyperinflation and political instability of pre-war Berlin but the lyrics are still accurate and money still makes the world go around.

As you have already received your Council Tax bills you will know that the Wiltshire Council part has been frozen again for the fourth year in a row. The average household will have saved £382 over the last five years even when just compared with inflation.

The Police, Fire and Rescue elements have increased by a smidgeon under 2% and Parish Councils have made their own decisions on their own precepts. Wiltshire Council's gross annual budget is almost £900 million – including schools and public health which are directly funded by central government. The net budget (after taking out schools and public health) for 2014/15 is £333 million and is almost £7.5 million lower than last year (2013/14).

This is a bit technical but what is says in plain English is that we have once again had to manage increased demand, such as the increasing costs of looking after elderly residents and inflation, with less money from government and without increasing Council Tax. In summary it's tough as we have had to save over £26 million as compared with last year but that is what the Administration of Wiltshire Council is there for!

One of the great joys of being a Wiltshire Councillor with a role in the Administration (or Cabinet as we refer to it in County Hall) is getting out and meeting people across our diverse and very special County. In my Cabinet role over the past year I have visited all of our 23 Leisure Centres and all of our 31 Libraries and by the end of next month I will have attended meetings of all of our 18 Community Area Boards. This has been a big task but it has also given me a great opportunity to meet the dedicated staff who make our Wiltshire services and democracy work and to see just how effective our new "localism" is in our communities.

In Wiltshire we have taken a decision to maintain our library, leisure and some youth service offerings when other local authorities are cutting theirs and we have also chosen to think "outside the box" and place these services as well as some highways projects all under community management by Community Area Boards.

We are also trying to deliver the physical and community aspects of these services through Community Area Campuses with the first Campus opening next month in Corsham and a whole raft of others, including our own Melksham Community Area Campus, opening by the end of 2016.

In order to get all of this to work we go back to money making the world go around and are having to make efficiencies. Wiltshire Council is trying hard to do much more with much less money and the only way we can do that is to succeed in our core goal of creating more resilient communities and encouraging local people to help shape and deliver their local services. Wiltshire Council has been encouraging local people to volunteer to help to run local services and this has already been a spectacular success with the library service and there will be many more opportunities to volunteer to help to run local services in the future.

So although money clearly does make the world go around, here in Wiltshire we are determined to deliver more services with less money and make our communities more resilient.

#### Edited Minutes of PC Meeting 14th May 2014 at 8:30pm in the Village Hall

Neighbourhood Policing. PC Thomas had sent the Clerk a written summary report of 16 reported incidents in Semington over the last year. Cllr. Oglesby reminded councillors that some parishioners had complained about the **indiscriminate vehicle parking** in the village, such as near the School/ Pound Close, and had enquired whether white kerbside lines could be painted on the road as a deterrent. Cllr. Smyth said he had spoken to Stuart Renfrew on this subject and he had indicated that such white lines were only appropriate where there are clear incidences of obstruction. The Clerk advised that in order to progress this matter it may be advisable to raise this at the CATG meeting and to consider whether the Parish Council would match fund any cost if Wiltshire Council supported the proposal.

Ancillary Day Room(Retrospective)

**Comments by 15/5/14** 

The application is incomplete. There are insufficient details relating to the dimensions of the Day Room. No scaled drawings have been provided. The Planning Inspector at the Appeal Hearing required the existing Day Room (and presumably this Day Room is the subject of this retrospective planning application) to be reduced in height. The Inspectors decision must be respected. The existing Day Room is a two storey building - not a Day Room as is commonly defined. The Parish Council seeks an explanation as to why the Inspector's decision has been ignored, why no enforcement notice has been served and why Wiltshire Council Development Control has sought to contrive a retrospective planning application to circumvent the Inspector's decision. The following planning application was received after 7 May 2014. The Council examined this planning application and resolved to send comments to Wiltshire Council as shown in italics:

14/04565/FUL 2 Pound Close The Parish Council has no comments. Proposed new dwelling **NEW**  Cllr. Scott confirmed that Wiltshire Council had delivered the 'Rural Housing Needs Survey' forms and he would deliver them to the Newsletter distributers for delivery to parishioners.

**Finance.** The Clerk reported the current financial position at 15 May 2014 – details available on request.

Highways/Environment. Cllr. Smyth stated that he had spoken to Stuart Renfrew, the Wiltshire Council Highways and Streetscene Focal Point and had raised the issues of vehicle parking on the pavements and grass cutting and he added that Mr Renfrew had noted that the judging for the **Best Kept** Village Competition was soon to take place. Cllr. Smyth reported that Wiltshire Council had now assumed the responsibility for cutting back the vegetation overhanging the footpath alongside the Village Hall. Cllr. Rimmer stated that he would make an S96 application to Wiltshire Council for planting shrubs along the earth bund at Littlemarsh and he invited Cllr. Scott to investigate possible species of plants that would be suited to that environment. It was agreed that planting details will be decided at a subseguent PC meeting. Cllr. Smyth cautioned that following discussions with Mr Renfrew careful consideration must be given to the exact location of any planting and that local landowners should be consulted. Cllr. Scott offered to request Wiltshire Wildlife Trust to undertake a full survey of Semington and its environs and for it to propose suitable local environmental schemes and the means of encouraging wildlife to thrive in the area. Councillors supported this proposal. The PC resolved to thank Martin Bray and Les Hiscock for their hard work and voluntary effort in maintaining the Village's grass verges. Semington War Memorial. The Clerk confirmed that the order for the renovation of the War Memorial and associated works had been placed on James Long (Masons) Ltd of Trowbridge following the last PC meeting. Wilts & Berks Canal. Cllr. Smyth reported that the Wilts & Berks Canal Working Group is in abeyance awaiting approval of the planning application. There is still some environmental assessment work to be completed. He commented that not all of the funding required for the project is yet available for the Melksham Link and it is thought that landowners were waiting for the plans to be approved before they submit their plans for development and thereby providing the means for additional funds.

**Any Other Business.** Cllr. Smyth – It was agreed that a Village-wide **Litter Pick** will take place on Monday 19 May 2014 at 6pm starting at the Village Hall. Cllr. Scott reported that the **Canal and River Trust** had still not removed the graffiti on the canal bridges that he had reported over a year ago despite a reminder and a promise by the Trust to attend to it directly.

Dear friends.

When I was growing up getting a model aircraft kit for a birthday was considered to be a good present. I loved them but, for some reason, they didn't like me. They required me to be meticulous and careful; I was neither. They required me to read instructions and follow them and I preferred to just stick them together because I knew better. What? Paint the pilot *before* putting him in the cockpit? Why that would take weeks and I only had one hour. There were always bits left over and there were always tears and tantrums and my dad invariably took over and brought the ill fated project to a conclusion.

I wonder how many of you men still try and assemble flat pack furniture without reading instructions. In a very real sense I failed miserably as a child where Airfix kits were concerned. You might have discerned that I was not a practical child. So then, how come I ended up as a carpenter/cabinet maker working patiently on intricate commissions all day every day for a considerable period of my life? Well, for a start I grew up and then, along the way, someone taught me to persevere and never give up. Someone taught me that failure was the key to success.

For some people 'failure' is a dirty word; 'failure is not an option'. With respect, giving up should not be an option. Failure is a great gift and gives us great gifts. When we fail at something we are given an opportunity to grow, to become a better human being. It allows us to reflect on what we might do next time; it allows us to seek the wisdom and advice of others; it allows us to improve techniques and discover better materials; it allows us to become listeners, learners and it teaches us humility. Most importantly it allows us to empathise with others and become mentors who understand life's tricks and turns.

The 'big' society we live in applauds success and rewards those who do well but it excoriates those who fail; bullying or verbally crucifying them on Twitter or Facebook; and if they are public figures, in the press or on television. At the same time most individuals would recognise the value of failure. Strange aren't we? It seems to me that we should always remember our own journey, our own failures and victories as well as those who mentored us before pointing the finger at others.

Peter the Apostle was always putting his foot in it, always speaking out of turn. All of his indiscretions could be forgiven; after all he was bumbling and clumsy, a bit of a lovable, comical character. How could he, though, be forgiven for denying that he even knew Jesus, after Jesus' arrest, (John 18:15) especially after he had vociferously claimed that he would die for him (John 13: 37). So poignant then the way in which Jesus not only forgave him, after his resurrection, but also restored him to full fellowship and friendship (John 21 15-17). As we read on through the New Testament it is often clear what Peter had learned from his failures and how that affected the way he related to others. In his greatest weakness he found acceptance, strength, healing, hope and a future in Jesus - and we can too.
