Well that's it, another season is over for Cricket Semington (the all new way to which we now refer to the team!).

CS finished the Calne Evening League in a creditable 7th place, and delivered a traditional mix of impressive and shameful performances. **This year's winners were Calne**, narrowly pipping the all-star team of Bishops Cannings. Of Semington's 18 games we won 4, tied 1, lost 7 and 6 cancelled (which reflects the damp start and finish to this year's summer). As I seem to have reported in each of the last few end of year summaries, several of the losses could have been reversed with another ounce of luck and judgement rather than them being a lack of skill and ability.

Top batting performers this year were newcomer **Steve Copland** (with 248 runs at an average of 49.6, including three not out retired half centuries) and **Fuzz Robinson** (with 184 runs at 36.8, and two not out retired 50s). Three bowlers vied for top performer role. Local hero, **Liam Snook** took most wickets (14), another newcomer, **Miles Copland** was second with 13 and the ever reliable **Josh Hamblin** third with 11. Miles was the most economical this year, going for just under 5 in his 45 overs, he also took the most catches (7).

Other sterling performances came from a few others in the team, most notably Semington's most promising youngster, **Steve James**, who picked up 6 wickets in his first full season.

The last game of the season was another wash out, but most of the squad met anyway at The Somerset Arms for the light hearted end of season awards. Thanks to **Mick and Alison** who hosted us after every home game with hearty food to celebrate and commiserate.

Thanks to all the players for playing this year and yet again making it a roaring laugh all the way. Huge thanks to club Chairman and President **Jack Woodward** who remains the foundation stone on which all Semington cricket has been built over the years. Stay fit over the winter and I look forward to welcome more newcomers to the squad for 2015. Nets in the winter at Devizes Leisure Centre and the new season will begin at the end of April. All the best.

Beware of "rip-off" gardening tradesmen

Please be aware that there are members of a mobile community currently working in the Chippenham (Wiltshire) area. They are "offering" gardening services to the elderly/vulnerable. They are aggressive, forceful and rude in their dealings with residents – and they appear to be using the NW trademark on leaflets to appear to be a legitimate business. They have no connection whatsoever with Neighbourhood Watch. An elderly lady was told "Your garden needs sorting out and we can do it for £380" (She has a front garden only – approx 8ft by 10ft – containing one small shrub and one slow-growing ornamental conifer.) When she told him she didn't have £380 in the house – ever – the male informed her that he could give her a lift to the bank. He was surly and bad-mannered when she declined and shut the door – he knocked on the door and shouted "I'm coming back tomorrow – make sure you're ready"! If you get such a visit don't enter into conversation with them - just close the door, then go and make sure that the back door is locked, and ring the police on 101.

Bat-Spotting!

There will be 2 ecologists wandering around at dawn & dusk bat-spotting over the next 3 months in the area of the proposed canal. Let's hope they spot the bats before the bats 'spot' them! (Ugh, sorry). They plan to be near Boundary Farm, Berryfield on Tuesday & Wednesday evening (9pm to 11.30 pm). But if the weather is bad, they may postpone.

Something New in Melksham!

The inaugural **Melksham River Festival** is being staged by the Wilts & Berks Canal Trust on the King George V Park in the centre of town on the weekend of **6th & 7th of September**. The aim of the festival is to publicise the proposed building of the Melksham Link canal from the Kennet & Avon at Semington to the River Avon and to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the closure of the canal. When built, this new waterway will enable boats to reach the centre of Melksham and will revitalize the river front. The event will feature boats on the river, public boat trips, canoe and sub-aqua diving demonstrations, Fire & Rescue service demonstrations, fairground rides for children and refreshment & food stalls. On the Saturday evening there will be illuminated boats on the river and a folk night at the Activity Centre.

The Festival will be open to the public, free of charge, on both days from 10am to 5pm on Saturday and 10am to 4pm on Sunday.

Visiting trailboats, steamboats & electric boats will be arriving on the Friday & launching into the river from the new slipway in the park. The Wilts & Berks Canal Trust's 37ft passenger-carrying narrowboat will arrive the previous week and will be running public trips from the Saturday 30th of August.

WILTSHIRE COUNCIL NEWS FROM JONATHON SEED

August is a relatively quiet month in general Council terms but it can be busy in some areas of business and particularly in Libraries and Leisure services, both of which are part of my Cabinet portfolio. I therefore take the opportunity to get out and about and visit some of the 31 Libraries and 23 Leisure centres in Wiltshire. This is a great opportunity to talk to people as they use the facilities and to chat to staff about what is going well and perhaps not so well in their services. I always come back with a list which is not universally popular with senior managers but that is life and one of the purposes of my getting out on the ground is to see how things are and what we can do better. I always also come back with renewed and great admiration for our hardworking Council staff who really want to deliver the very best service that they can to the residents of Wiltshire and that is why being able to have a straightforward conversation with their Cabinet Member is so important.

In August I attended the rededication of the newly refurbished Semington War Memorial. Ray Heard and his team did a wonderful job in raising the funds and driving the project forward. The work took place over many months and the end result was quite outstanding. Not only do we now have a pristine War memorial as a fitting tribute to those who gave their todays for our tomorrows but it also bears all the names of the fallen in both two World Wars and the Korean War. This in itself is unusual in Wiltshire. The dedication service was held on Sunday 3rd August in lovely summer sunshine and attended by standard bearers from the Royal British Legion as well as Parish Councillors and many villagers who simply wanted to attend and remember. Ray Heard deserves great credit for leading this project and we look forward to the book he is writing on the subject.

Summer is also a great time to catch up with locals at local events. I attend any local political events that I can and really enjoyed the Summerham Conservative lunch attended by 90 people in Keevil and at which I joined in a question and answer session with the local MP and a local Peer as well as having a jolly lunch and raising funds for the local Branch. I also make an effort to attend fetes and local events whenever I can and they are always a great opportunity to pick up news and views. Each event is different but they all seem to get through the pocketful of change that I bring along to spend on the local produce and car boot type stalls, not forgetting other essentials like food, beer, cider and ice cream! Over the summer I also produce my annual summer In Touch leaflet letting people know what I have been doing as their local Councillor. I do this through a network of local helpers many of whom are not at all political but are happy to help deliver a few leaflets in their village for an hour a year. 

Dear friends. What's in a greeting? Whether it is a greeting as we meet another or say goodbye to them we will all have our own habits and preferences. But what is our intention as we do that, if indeed we have one at all? Are our ways of saying hello and goodbye just dyed-in-the-wool fragments of tradition passed to us, along with 'please' and 'thank you', by those who sought to prepare us for polite society? Have we even thought about what we say as we greet others?

It's funny how one day you just wake up and find yourself listening to and watching the way people communicate and asking why do we do what we do and say what we say and what does it all mean? Whilst in the USA my wife, Lorna, entered a large department store and was treated to "Hi there, how are you?" Being both polite and British (*is there a difference between the two*) she replied, "I am well thank you. How are you?" The 'Meeter and Greeter' on the door was stunned to silence. She had not expected any kind of response to her robotic greeting and was totally flustered as Lorna was surprised that the greeting had been so hollow. Of course when we greet someone we know and love the outcome is completely different.

What got me thinking was the way in which different cultures meet each other. I was particularly impressed by the Zulu greeting '**sawobona**'. It means a great deal more than a simple hello. Sawobona broadly means 'I see you'. According to a reliable source, the response, 'Ngikhona' means '*I am here*'. As always when translating from one language to another, crucial subtleties are lost. Inherent in the Zulu greeting and our grateful response, is the sense that until you saw me, I didn't exist. By recognizing me, you brought me into existence. A Zulu folk saying clarifies this, "*Umuntu ngumuntu nagabantu*", meaning, "*A person is a person because of other people*".

I like the idea that the greeting expresses our interdependence and connectedness; that we are not isolated as we sometimes think we are and behave as if we are. Imagine being greeted by someone who says, "I see you", I see you as a person of value and worth and as someone who has needs as well as gifts to give. The underlying sentiment is that we are here to walk with each other, listen to each other, make room for each other, weep with each other and comfort and build up each other. If you really believed that then you could reply, "Then I am alive".

Well just imagine that, Christians are meant to greet each other and others

with the same passion and conviction. The Bible indicates that to be fully human we must be fully connected. Jesus' humanity demonstrates this. In the Bible read Philippians 2 and you will see this. Jesus came among us and saw us in the deepest sense. He identified with us, loved us, walked with us, wept with us, in fact he still does by his Spirit in each other and now calls us to do the same. Even without a faith we couldn't do worse than thinking about the way we greet and connect with each other. Even if we still only say 'hello' let us say it as if we meant, "I see you". May God bless you all
