Outcome from the Housing Needs Survey

Semington Parish Council has welcomed a Wiltshire Council report on housing needs in the village, and is grateful to everyone who took the trouble to respond. The report will be helpful as we work with villagers to think about, and plan for, any future housing development. The survey shows that there's a moderate ongoing need for housing in Semington. It also shows that, if there is to be new housing, villagers want this to be small scale development of 2 and 3 bedroom family and retirement accommodation. Most of this should be available to purchase, with some of this available for shared or low-cost ownership. This accords with the Parish Council's own wishes for Semington to retain the character of a small village community and remain the sort of place where people like to live. Copies of the survey report are available in the Village Hall.



SEMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL - Edited Minutes of 17th Sept. 2014

Five members of the public were present initially.

Neighbourhood Policing.

1. August: Male released from custody, walked along the canal, stole a bike from The Barge, then was located along the canal and arrested again for the theft of the bike!

2. September: Steeple Ashton, Ashton Lane, Alpacas container broken into and lawnmower and tools taken. Also at a similar time along the same lane at Mud Mead an insecure car had sat nav taken from dash board.

Planning.

(a)14/07713/FUL-51 Littlemarsh-NEW-Demolition of existing dwelling and erection of replacement dwelling with detached double garage.

These comments below in italics to be sent to Wiltshire Council:

The Council objects to this proposed development. The new dwelling should assume the same building line as the original dwelling i.e. the front of the new dwelling should coincide with the front of the existing dwelling. The proposed dwelling is much larger than the original dwelling and by moving it southwards it blocks light and is very intrusive. This proposed development is contrary to Policy C38 of the West Wiltshire District Plan in that there will be a significant loss of privacy and over shadowing of neighbouring properties. The existing physical separation between Nos. 51, 50 and 52 Littlemarsh should be preserved. The garage is to remain located as proposed.

(b)14/07757/FUL-15 Church St-NEW-Side extension to ground and first floors.

The Council has no objections to this proposed development.

(c)Cllr. Scott reported that the Final Report of the Rural Housing Needs Survey had been issued containing the statement requested by the Council. He was requested to place copies in the Village Hall and was asked to contact Wiltshire Council to enquire whether it will make use of the report or take account of it when considering planning applications.

Highways/Environment.

The Council resolved that Mr Renfrew of Streetscene Focal Point be thanked for ensuring that the roundabout grass had been cut regularly this year. The Chairman stated that Cllr. Robinson had contacted Wiltshire Council in relation to possible road safety improvements at Semington and a reply was awaited.

World War 1 Commemorations/Semington War Memorial.

The Council resolved that Mr Ray Heard, whose initiative gave rise to this successful event, should be thanked. Cllr. Rimmer reported that an oak tree had been planted to commemorate the anniversary and the Council agreed to the purchase of an engraved plaque to be placed nearby.

Any Other Business.

The Chairman stated that 'defibrillators' were being supplied to local organisations and that he would obtain further information for the Council.

Addendum to Parish Council Minutes from page 7

Wiltshire Housing Site Allocations DPD & Settlement Boundaries Consultation. The Council discussed this at some length and also noted the comments made by members of the public during the Public Adjournment. The Council resolved to respond to Wiltshire Council as below (in italics):

Do you consider that the criterion for defining the proposed settlement boundaries to be the correct ones? Comment: No.

Do you consider that the proposed draft settlement boundaries are drawn in accordance with the criterion? Comment: No.

Are there any areas of the proposed draft settlement boundaries that should be modified? Comment: Yes.

Are you looking at reviewing your settlement boundary through a neighbourhood plan? Comment: No.

Do you have any additional comments relevant to the boundary review?

Comment: Semington Parish Council cannot understand the reasons for the proposed new boundaries not following the normal curtilages of houses and field boundaries. For example, at Grid Reference G6 there is a horizontal (East/West) division of the field. The criterion that excludes 'curtilages of properties which have the capacity to extend the built form of the settlement. This includes large residential gardens' is not agreed.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Microsoft Virus??

We've all had repeated calls from 'Microsoft' claiming they have detected a virus on your computer and have you noticed it takes ages to get logged on? They can fix it for £50.... Of course there isn't a virus (or at least not one they can detect) and if there was one they couldn't fix it! Do not be drawn in to a conversation with them – just put the phone down, or if you're feeling mischievous, say "just hold on a minute" and put the handset under a cushion for a while.



Thefts

It's been reported that two chainsaws have been stolen from an outbuilding, and elsewhere entry was gained to a house via a skylight. A car was stolen and an untidy search of the house was made. Recently two males made off near the Corston area of Malmesbury after an owner of a property came home to find them in his shed. One of the males is described as wearing a pink top and a baseball cap. They drove from the location towards Corston in a white van, possibly an insignia model. If anyone noticed this van in their area or any males matching the description please can you contact Wiltshire Police on 101. It is clear that we still have people visiting the area to target sheds and outbuildings so please keep vigilant and secure your property the best way you can.

Pension Laws

There will be a lot of people with a lot of cash around soon with the change in the pension laws, which will need careful handling. Do not be drawn into scams by people calling themselves 'pension liberators' or the like, who can take all your pension and leave you destitute. Also remember that if you take your pension pot early you will be liable to a tax bill of 55% (or 70% if you fail to report it to HMRC).

On-Line Money Transfers

Be careful when transferring money electronically i.e. on-line. There have been several reports of people making simple errors and accidentally sending their money to the wrong account. If you need to send large amounts send a small amount first to make sure it gets through.

St George's is once more a hive of activity and it has been wonderful to see so many children returning to school eager to share all the wonderful experiences they have had over the summer. There has been a wonderful buzz around the school with the children eagerly and enthusiastically engaging with the learning. A special mention has to go out to our new Reception children as they have settled extremely quickly and also to our other new starters in the other year groups. The school welcomed 18 Reception children this year and 5 children in other year groups taking our total to 79 pupils.



To welcome the new parents into the school community the Friends of St George's are holding a welcome tea after school on Friday 19th October in the school hall.

Prior to the children returning to school, the staff attended two training days, one covered First Aid and the other was spent with governors and focused on the school ethos, as we felt that the existing school ethos of: "Learning, Sharing, Caring" was too generic and did not adequately reflect the specific character of St George's School. Following a discussion about the core values that we aim to instil in the school, we came up with the new ethos: "In God's love we cherish, challenge and inspire" – you may have already spotted it on the website! We aim, over the next few weeks, to explain this change to the children, and to clarify the meaning of the words chosen, so that they are aware of why it is so important and to enable them to encourage each other in living it out.

The school has changed our catering provision, and we welcome Dawn Payne to the school to serve the children's dinners. Dawn has replaced Michelle Kelly who chose to continue her contract with our previous caterers. Dawn has settled in very quickly and the response from children, staff and parents to Dawn and the new catering company – SODEXHO, has been extremely positive.

The new academic year also sees us implementing a new curriculum which we hope will provide a fantastic base to drive the children's learning forward.

As a reminder, if you are a parent with a child who is due to start primary school in September 2015, applications need to be received at Wiltshire Council by 15th January 2015. St George's will be holding an Open Morning to welcome prospective parents on Thursday 6th November.



In line with part of our new ethos 'to inspire', on Friday the 12th September the children watched the Tour of Britain cycle race and cheered on the cyclists. They thoroughly enjoyed it and waved their flags enthusiastically - we hope this inspired them and showed what can be achieved through hard work and determination!

WILTSHIRE COUNCIL NEWS FROM JONATHON SEED

Melksham River Festival

As the leaves fall, the pace of Council business picks up with memories of holidays for those that could take a break, becoming just that. I was not able to go away this summer and was quite busy periodically in County Hall but I did get out and about locally a great deal. One of the events that I attended on a lovely early September Saturday was the Melksham River Festival. This was a superb event where the Wiltshire and Berkshire Canal Trust gave a great showcase of the opportunities that are on offer for the town of Melksham and all our surrounding villages when the canal extensions and the river eventually join in this exciting project. I fully support this project and will do all that I can to help it along.

Rights of Way Dept

One of the issues that I have picked up is that as the Council becomes leaner and strives to be more efficient there are more and more examples of where communities need to be encouraged to help themselves. An example of this is with our Rights of Way department. Wiltshire has a great network of Rights of Way but central government cuts of 30% to Council funding has meant that the Council has to be more efficient across the board and that includes in the maintenance of our Rights of Way. Coincidentally the new My Wiltshire app has given residents a superbly efficient opportunity to report problems with roads, waste, environment and of course Rights of Way (and if you have not downloaded the application have a go!). However the law of unintended consequences has come into play and the new app has increased reporting of Rights of Way issues by 25% and reconciling the two clearly presents a management challenge to Council officers.

Local Interest Groups

The result of doing more with less is that communities also need to be prepared to do more for themselves or accept that some things which we have expected the Council to do may no longer be possible as the Council reverts to concentrating on its statutory requirements. One of the ways to get more done is to encourage the formation of local interest groups to help with path clearance and this is proving to be highly effective in many parishes across the County or possibly doing things for ourselves and doing (as I do) the mowing of the roadside grass verges outside our own houses.



NATURE NOTES

Hurrahing in Harvest

SUMMER ends now; now, barbarous in beauty, the stooks arise
Around; up above, what wind-walks! what lovely behaviour
Of silk-sack clouds! has wilder, wilful-wavier
Meal-drift moulded ever and melted across skies?
I walk, I lift up, I lift up heart, eyes,
Down all that glory in the heavens to glean our Saviour;
And, éyes, héart, what looks, what lips yet gave you a
Rapturous love's greeting of realer, of rounder replies?
And the azurous hung hills are his world-wielding shoulder
Majestic – as a stallion stalwart, very-violet-sweet! –
These things, these things were here and but the beholder
Wanting; which two when they once meet,
The heart rears wings bold and bolder
And hurls for him, O half hurls earth for him off under his feet.



Gerard Manley Hopkins drafted this, typically complex and prematurely modern, sonnet in September 1877 in the Vale of Clwyd, as he walked home from a day's fishing in the River Elwy. It's a harvest festival sort of poem.

THE BOOK CLUB



Nine members, including one new member - welcome to Prisca - attended on Thurs 18 Sept and gave their opinions on *You're Next* by Gregg Hurwitz. He was unknown as an author to most members and Jill had done some research on him. He has written 14 thrillers and has been translated into 22 languages. The majority of members found the book a gripping, page turner with great characters and the suspense had a dash of humour. Some members found the scenario unbelievable and did not like the graphic violence. Overall however a 'yes' vote. World War 1 Commemorations/Semington War Memorial. 1914-1918



The weather on the 3rd of August 1914 was 17.1c sunny. One hundred years later the villagers gathered at 3pm, again a sunny day, at the War Memorial in the churchyard to remember all those who left Semington to join the Great War (the war to end all wars).

Sadly 10 did not return and 2 more died as a result of their war service in 1920-1921. They are buried in the churchyard and St George's is listed as a Commonwealth War Cemetery. The refurbishment of our memorial would not have been possible without the very major donations from the businesses at Semington Turnpike, Marcos Cars, Semington Crematorium, Manor Farm and the local Villagers. Melksham area board provided funds.

The service was supported by military associations, RN White Star, Army, Royal Engineers, Duke of Edinburgh's Royal Regiment (Wilts), Korean War, and the Royal British Legion, all with their standards. Following the service, tea was held at the Village Hall which let the hall free with a donation from the Parish Council. What's in a Day Off ?

Dear Friends,

Oh what a fascinating subject this is; too much to cover in detail in this short letter. I find myself increasingly concerned by the way we live and work. Perhaps I should substitute the word 'I' for 'we'. In particular the attitude of many to a day of rest is worrying. We live such busy lives now and many I know are driven from dawn to dusk. Having just been to Sweden it is clear to me that our approach as a nation to work/life balance is appalling if not a danger to health, wellbeing and family life. Employers' demands of their staff in some areas of commerce, industry and the caring professions, especially salaried employees, show a distinct lack of respect for human need, family life and, indeed, themselves. This is not helped at all by our successive governments' policies and, for that matter, sometimes our own desires for more, bigger and better. In Sweden 8 hours, on the whole, means 8 hours and not 10 or even 12. What I really struggle with is the notion that many willing to work this way see themselves as providing a better life for their families, when in fact in order to achieve their goal they are sacrificing the very thing that they are working for, their family.

It is important to recognise at this point, of course, that some are forced to live this way in order to survive and I struggle with that too. By and large, however, the problem is not so much individual in origin, rather, it is systemic, and as a culture we will be forced along in the current until we decide to do differently.

That is easier said than done but making changes is not impossible. We may not be able to change everything but we can change some things. For me, swept along by a busy job that is ever demanding and never ending – literally – the key is making choices that are life giving and life building. The focus of this is a day off a week, a day of rest. Rest is not about lying about doing nothing, though if that is your choice so be it, it is about coming back to our centre, bringing order out of chaos, building our relationships, enjoying, smiling, laughing. That could include tasks that maintain life, washing, shopping, etc. but ideally rest should restore balance. A wise person once said to me, "If

you don't take your rest days then they will all come at once and you will be too ill to enjoy them".

As a child Sunday was always kept special. Brought up in a strict Christian family I found them really boring and limiting; not a healthy picture of a rest day either. Although I am consciously not wanting to preach a 'religious' message here it is worth noting Jesus' attitude to the Sabbath in Mark's Gospel. He said, "People were not made for the good of the Sabbath. The Sabbath was made for the good of people. In other words it is for our health, wellbeing and benefit. In saying this, Jesus was completely consistent with the commandment 'Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy'. Holy simply means, set apart, without all the baggage of the meaning from our childhoods. For Christians that would mean 'set apart for God', which includes family and activities that build life together – this would, for us, include meeting together not because we have to but because we want to and because we believe we are resourced in that by God.

History shows us that we need this rest. Various attempts to manipulate the length and composition of the week have failed miserably. It is worth going online and reading about Stalin's attempt in the early 20th century. We need to value ourselves and each other, we need to decide what is important in life and we need to make the space we require to make us human with all our beauty, creativity, quirks, love and passion. There is meant to be a day of rest for a reason! Every blessing.
