Planning Application 20/01306/OUT Land North of St George's Road

Peter Smith Vice-Chair Semington Parish Council

The Parish Council has objected to the proposal to build up to 20 entry-level affordable dwellings on this field because [i] no evidence was put forward that these are needed in Semington at this time; [ii] the applicants took no note of the affordable properties to be built by Hannick Homes along St George's Road where construction starts this year; and [iii] affordable housing should be built in places where people need it and not in villages with few employment opportunities, no shops, and comparatively poor public transport.

The Council also thinks that the reasons for turning down previous applications to build on this field remain valid. For example:

- The field is outside the limits of development defined for Semington.
- The development would protrude into the open countryside and would have a harmful impact on the character and appearance of Semington and the surrounding rural landscape.
- The proposal conflicts with Core Policy 1 of the Wiltshire Core strategy because it is not sustainable development. It also conflicts with Core Policies 51 and 57, and with paragraph 170 of the National Planning Policy Framework.

The proposal is essentially the same as the previous applications that have been made for the development of this field, and it seems likely that were this proposal to succeed, the applicants would then seek to build on the whole field.

We know from our previous experiences that village opinion matters when Wiltshire Council planners are considering issues. Whatever you think, we urge you to make your voice heard. Parish Council Minutes

Abridged minutes from meeting held on Wednesday 4th March 2020

Present: Councillors B Smyth (Chairman), R Blake, P Bowyer, M Kasasian, R Oglesby, S Rimmer, W Scott, P Smith and the Clerk Roger Coleman. There were two members of the public present initially.

Apologies: Apologies from non-attendance were received and accepted from Parish Councillor C Wade and Community Policing Team PCSO J Gould.

Community Policing: PCSO Gould of the Community Policing Team had sent the Clerk the February monthly report that he had subsequently sent to all councillors. One report for Semington - St Georges Primary School. Unknown male has been seen by various parents hanging around outside the school gates carrying a big camera around his neck.

Wiltshire Council Report: In the absence of Cllr. Seed no report was given.

Planning: Councillors noted that the decision regarding the Village Green will be made at the forthcoming Western Area Planning Committee meeting due to be held on 18th March 2020. The Clerk was asked to place this item on the Agenda of the next Parish Council meeting. Councillors also noted that the Planning Appeal in respect of Planning application 19/02147/OUT is to take place on 13/14th May 2020. The Council resolved to investigate the current progress of the Wiltshire Council enforcement action in respect of Lansdowne and the letting of caravans for hire.

Cllr. Scott stated that the meeting of the Wiltshire, Swindon and Oxfordshire Canal Partnership is to take place on 5th March, and that he would be attending that meeting. He explained that there does appear to exist a conflict between the Partnership and the Environmental Agency regarding the Melksham Link and its access to the River Avon that needs clarification and resolution.

Finance: Balance as at 4th March 2020 £31,816.36

Environment: Councillors noted that the Litter Pick will take place on 14th March and those individuals taking part should meet at 10.00am, Village Hall. The Clerk tabled the Wiltshire Council Green Infrastructure Survey Form for discussion. There ensued a lengthy discussion regarding the nature of this survey and how the views of parishioners are to be sought. Cllr. Scott agreed to complete the Survey Form on behalf of the Parish Council but would beforehand obtain extra copies of the form for distribution at the Village Hall Coffee Morning for parishioners to also offer their views and that he would make reference to this Survey on the Village website.

Highways: The Council <u>resolved</u> to take no further action at present in respect of the Traffic Survey and steps to secure a lower speed limit (i.e. 20mph) in Semington. This view was prompted largely by the expressed views of parishioners.

World War 2 – End of Hostilities Commemoration: The Council <u>resolved</u> not to plant additional oak trees to commemorate the end of hostilities but it <u>resolved</u> that the deaths of the five local WW2 servicemen during that conflict and the one serviceman who died during the Korean War would be commemorated by the addition of a brass plaque recording their sacrifice to be placed on the Memorial Bench. It was agreed that ClIrs. Rimmer and Kasasian would decide on the appropriate wording for the plaque.

Footpaths: The Chairman reported that the Ramblers Association members under the auspices of Wiltshire Council plus some parish councillors had cleared paths SEMI14 and SEMI17 in Semington as an ongoing project to clear/reopen existing Rights of Way in Semington and that he had personally thanked those involved. The Parish Council <u>resolved</u> that those involved should also be thanked by the Parish Council. The Chairman stated that he would take the necessary action. Cllr. Smyth stated that the Semington Footpath Survey Sheet had been updated accordingly.

Wessex Close Play Areas: The Council noted that Wiltshire Council had contributed £6000 towards the Play Area – as promised. The Council <u>resolved</u> that the Clerk takes action for the repair of the Tornado play equipment. Further discussions on the future of the Wessex Close Play Area was deferred until a subsequent meeting. The Chairman, Cllr. Smyth, stated that there had been no response from parishioners to date regarding the establishment of a Community Group to promote and manage the Wessex Close Play Area. The Chairman asked the Clerk to place this matter on the Agenda for the next Parish Council meeting. Cllr. Smith stated that he would be visiting St Georges School and to discuss the subject of Play Equipment with the Headteacher and with the PTA (Parent Teachers Association) in order to inform the various options available to the Parish Council. Cllr. Rimmer added that he was also intending to visit the school for discussions regarding the Play Area and the planting of trees at agreed sites in the village.

Semington Post Office: Cllr. Oglesby reported that negotiations/discussions are continuing regarding the future of the Post Office. Cllr. Scott added that he and a number of parishioners had made representations to Post Office Ltd and, in this case, to the MP, Michelle Donelan, regarding the importance of maintaining the Post Office at Semington.

Any Other Business: There were no matters raised.

Thought From The Rectory

Throughout my life (and I'm 61) I have been fortunate enough to live in a stable, democratic society. Although I have often thought about and prayed for those living in fear, amongst the chaos of war, civil unrest or natural disaster I have never had to face it personally. And yet, in a few short weeks, we are living in what still feels an unreal situation.

Jesus, at the first Easter, lived with fear, suffering and death. He knew that the crowds who cheered him into Jerusalem were going to turn on him. He knew that those in power would conspire with one another to lead him to an unjust trial and death. He knew that his followers would think that he had been defeated – and that evil and suffering had triumphed.

That was Mary Magdalene's view as she went to Jesus tomb: -"Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance."

Initially she was terrified, fearing that Jesus' body had been stolen. In despair she ran to tell Jesus' friends. It was only later, after asking a figure outside the tomb if he knew where Jesus had been taken, that she realised this was Jesus – now risen from the dead! She was filled with new hope and joy.

Ever since people have discovered new hope, peace and purpose through daring to believe that faith in Jesus can make a positive difference to their lives. And it is often during times of fear and suffering that people turn to God for help. Through this people frequently find that God gives them a peace that passes human understanding and a resilience that helps them cope.

The Bible teaches that times of suffering and challenge can result in something positive. I am already sensing a desire in our villages to become stronger as a community and to support each other – it is good that networks are being formed to assist with this.

I would like to leave you with a poem which sums up what I hope will be the legacy of this difficult time: -

"When this is over, may we never again take for granted A handshake with a stranger Full shelves at the store Conversations with neighbours A crowded theatre Friday night out The taste of communion A routine check-up The school rush each morning Coffee with a friend The stadium roaring Each deep breath A boring Tuesday Life itself.

> when this ends may we find that we have become more like the people we wanted to be we were called to be we hoped to be and may we stay that way — better for each other because of the worst."
